

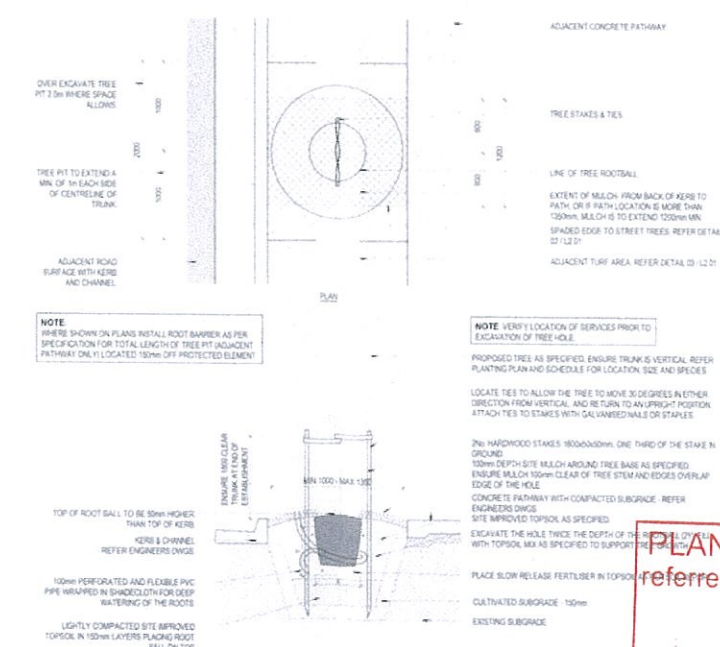


Legend

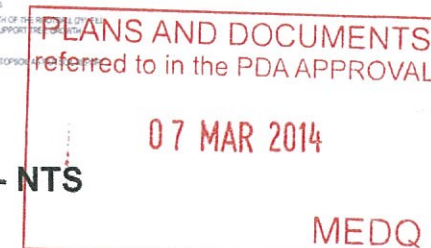
- 1 Native character of open space to be applied to adjoining street.
- 2 Native character to extend into adjacent streets and transition to typical local street character.
- 3 Parkland may include flowering feature trees.
- 4 Throated entry to streets with groups of trees and mass planting.
- 5 Additional trees to secondary lot frontages.
- 6 Informal planting style with multiple trees of varying species.
- 7 Mixed tree species including hardy exotics and native trees.
- 8 Create opportunities where canopies may connect.
- 9 Informal groups of Hoop Pine trees (Yarrabilba signature tree) along trunk collector roads with pockets of Eucalypts.
- 10 Informal median planting including native trees, Hoop Pine and groups and flowering exotic trees.
- 11 Open lawn with ground modelling along collector roads.
- 12 Occasional Fig tree planted where space permits avoiding road pavement and underground service conflicts.
- 14 Signature trees associated with major "hike and bike" routes.

Note:

Good horticultural practise required including soil improvement and focus on correct planting technique.
